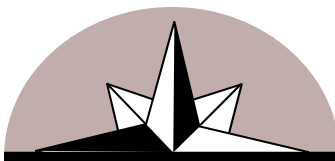

THE CITIZENS' VOICE - TRANSFORMING DIVERSE CITIZEN VOICES INTO ONE CIVIC CHOIR

Applied Information Resources currently staffs an initiative to strengthen the voice of citizens in the public/community life of Cincinnati. It is a process that AIR is calling "The Citizens' Voice." The initial phase of this initiative included bringing together involved citizens to discuss their views about citizen participation and how diverse citizens can come together to have a stronger role in public decision making

Some comments from attendees of these discussions are instructive. "Democracy requires a healthy citizen voice. We have to get to a point where average citizens aren't just shunted aside. Citizens need to know the process at least as well as

the bureaucrats." **George Getty**, Executive Director of the Greater Cincinnati Coalition for the Homeless.

Ron Miller, former Director of the Hamilton County Planning Department, adds: Every time a public initiative gets underway, citizen engagement needs to be part of

the process. That's the essence of democracy." "Any initiative called 'The Citizens' Voice' should be flexible, open, broad-based, inquisitive, and persistent." **Josh Kreckler**, President of the Green Party.

"How do we get people to start thinking that - 'your issue is my issue.'" **Bonnie Neumeier**, civic activist and Over-the-Rhine leader.

This September, Citizens' Voice participants took the next step. They convened at the Peaslee Neighborhood Center to hear about a proposed City ordinance designed to protect low-income neighborhoods from new environmental

COMMUNITY ISSUES FORUM KICKS OFF NEW SEASON

A new season of Community Issues Forums kicked off this fall with a series that focused on candidates and issues to be decided on November 4th. The proposed City Charter Amendments on Proportional Representation and banning red light cameras received attention on September 18th, while the five state initiatives were reviewed on October 30th.

Other Forums in October included presentations by candidates for Congress in the First and Second Districts and candidates for the Ohio House of Representatives.

health hazards. David Altman, co-chair of the Environmental Justice Working Group, briefed them about the contents of the proposal, and he explained how concerned citizens could have an impact

on City Council's legislative process. This meeting sparked a number of attendees to attend a Council hearing on the proposed Environmental Justice Ordinance.

In the months ahead, AIR will continue to facilitate the Citizens' Voice as it evolves as an informal

network for sharing issues and concerns and for taking collective action when a consensus can be achieved.
